CAN AJ CAZANA & ANTHONY ANDREWS BRAND THEIR NAMES IN NWA HISTORY?

It's been 200 days and counting!

Anthony Andrews and AJ Cazana are already the third-longest reigning United States tag team champions in National Wrestling Alliance history. As the upcoming NWA 75 pay-per-view approaches, The Country Gentlemen have runner-up honors firmly in their crosshairs!

"We're walking out of St. Lous 'and still," says Andrews, "Then our next stop is passing The Steiners in the record books!"

No team has come close to catching U.S.

Tag team leaders The Midnight Express (*Top Right*). Starting in 1987, "Sweet" Stan and "Beautiful" Bobby — led by Jim Cornette — became the most dominant duo in the titles' storied existence, relinquishing the straps only after winning the World tag titles from Arn Anderson and Tully Blanchard.


For now, The Midnights' mind-blowing 346 days as champions remain out of reach. Still, The Country Gentlemen are jockeying to pass second-placeholders Rick and Scott Steiner. In 1990, the brothers from Michigan ended The Midnight's historic *third* tenure to begin a legendary 225 days as champs in their own right.

Finally, an astonishing three-plus decades later and with AJ's dad Joe Cazana guiding the way, the Gentlemen are nipping at the Steiners' heels. To reach that goal, the cousin combo has a few mighty hurdles in their path.

First Andrews and Cazana must survive NWA's annual Aug. 26-27 anniversary extravaganza and the subsequent television tapings in Nashville. If they can walk out of those with the straps, The Country Gentlemen will claim the second-longest U.S. tag title reign.

Ready to play spoiler are two teams who face off on night one of *NWA 75* for a title opportunity the following day. The Country Gentlemen will defend against either Daisy Kill and Talos or The Fixers, the very duo they defeated for the belts.


"It doesn't matter who we face in St. Louis," insists thirdgeneration star AJ Cazana. According to "The Brute from Bullhead Ranch," "There's no way in hell anyone is going to stop us from making our mark in history."






Either The Fixers (Above) or Daisy Kill and Talos (Below) will challenge The Country Gentlemen on Day 2 of NWA 75.







On the surface, it's simply another, epic battle for the National Wrestling Alliance World's Heavyweight title. On Aug. 27, at the *NWA 75* pay-per-view, champion Tyrus puts the belt on the line against No. 1 contender EC3.

Of course, there are the added stipulations, which make it much more interesting. For reasons still unclear to many, the champion requested a bullrope match — and upped the ante considerably, putting his career on the line in the main event of the two-day anniversary spectacular.

For the former National champion, it's more than just a chance to win the most coveted World's Heavyweight championship in professional wrestling (his third World title, but first in the NWA). It's a rare opportunity to retire his opponent.

Beneath all that, though, insiders say this is much more than just a World's title match. They suggest it is actually a very pointed, extremely personal confrontation more than a half-decade in the making. Years ago, when both worked for TNA, the men were thick as thieves. Then acting as a special enforcer, for months Tyrus protected World Champion EC3.

"At the time, everyone knew Tyrus was the primary reason EC3 was so incredibly successful," says one grappler, who worked closely with the two in 2016 and — until recently — competed in the NWA as well.

"Tyrus ran interference for him," says the source, "Even though it helped make him a two-time TNA World Champion, I think EC3 became bitter some folks thought he only had the belt because of Tyrus."

More importantly, the source says, EC3 could blame Tyrus for playing a role in his forced departure from the company. By 2018, their relationship had fallen apart, leading to Tyrus defeating EC3 by pinfall only weeks before the latter received a "pink slip" which ended his tenure with IMPACT.

"Daddy, EC3 was sent packing — and Tyrus was the last person to defeat him before he left," says NWA manager Aron Stevens, also in TNA at the time.





"That's got to be a tough pill to swallow," Stevens said, "And a guy with an ego like EC3 doesn't forget that. At NWA 75, you can bet he's got more on his mind than just becoming NWA World's champion!"


Now many years down the road, the roles are reversed. Tyrus is NWA World's Heavyweight champion; EC3 seeks to reestablish himself as one of pro wrestling's top names. The battle lines are drawn for a war that, for the men involved, could either be career-redefining...or career-ending.

"We've heard it time after time; EC3's here to 'control his narrative.' It's possible that means rewriting everything fans know of his career to date and successes in other companies," notes Joe Galli.

"What absolutely goes without saying," NWA's senior broadcaster continues, "Is winning the NWA World's heavyweight title and retiring Tyrus on our biggest pay-per-view event of the year absolutely will write a whole new chapter of his 'narrative' moving forward."

Tim Storm won't speculate on why EC3 might target Tyrus beyond the obvious: The NWA World's Championship. He does share an opinion which seems to differ from others on what the match might mean to both competitors.


Most consider the stakes highest for the champion — who will be forced to retire if he does not win. The former NWA World's champion, though, is certain *both* men "are feeling the pressure"... for entirely different reasons.




"If Tyrus loses, it's a done deal; his career is over. It's pretty cut and dry. But if EC3 can't get the job done, then what?" Storm asks.

"His career will continue," he asserts, "But he's already relinquished the National belt just to get this shot at the title. I don't think EC3 has a clue what to do if he doesn't walk out as champ.

"For a guy all about 'control,' that thought must scare him to death," Storm concludes, "And I think he'll do anything necessary to make sure he *never* has to face it. If I were Tyrus, I'd be very, *very* careful."

It's possible. Weeks after Vampiro returned at Crockett Cup, Violent J popped back up.

"I'm over here thinking 'If Vamp can do it, maybe I can do it, and who's over there kicking mucho grande ass with a big clown shoe but Yabo and Ruffo, killing it!" Violent J stated.

"So I made the call...Now we're coming together at The Chase, NWA 75!" he said, issuing a challenge to his one-time partner. "I'm going to be in their corner management style — just like you, Vamp!"

While Violent J's taunts caught many off-guard, those close to the matter are not surprised. Reports indicate the his partnership with the clowns potentially started earlier this year, when The Brothers of Funstruction attended the 2023 Gathering of Juggalos in Ohio.

"Yabo and Ruffo were there," another insider confirms, "Two weeks later, they defeated La Rebelión and Vampiro on TV. That can't be a coincidence."

Others within NWA agree. Most realize Violent J's reemergence seems meticulously planned — as if to cause the most trouble possible for Vampiro.

Violent J has placed targets on the backs of the NWA World Tag Champs and their advisor at the most inopportune time of the year. La Rebelión already has a colossal task ahead at NWA 75, taking place Aug. 26-27 in St. Louis and broadcasting globally on FiteTV.

On night one, the champs are challenged by Aron Stevens' Blunt Force Trauma, who defeated them in this year's Crockett Cup. Should Bestia and Mecha Wolf survive with belts in-tact, they face Crockett Cup winners Mike Knox and Trevor Murdoch the next night.

According to our sources, Violent J insists The Brothers of Funstruction will make certain Vampiro's charges do *not* leave St. Louis with the gold. Whether that happens or not, The Brothers of Funstruction with Violent J in their corner *are* on a collision course with Vampiro's La Rebelión.

"I don't know what his motive is — and maybe we'll never find out — but one thing is definite: Violent J wants Vampiro to walk out of *NWA 75* emptyhanded," the source said,

"Though Violent J doesn't seem to have a problem with La Rebelión specifically, unfortunately they stand in the way of his obvious desire to ruin his old pal," the insider confirmed, "And he's made it very clear to Yabo and Ruffo that they *must* destroy Vampiro at all costs!"

In just three short years, the Burke Invitational Gauntlet has established itself as one of the most exciting, high-stakes events in the National Wrestling Alliance.

Named for the legendary Mildred Burke, a Hall of Fame wrestler who held the NWA Women's championship for nearly two decades, the annual event offers hand-selected competitors from around the world a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. The last combatant standing not only earns the prestigious Burke Memorial Cup but a shot at the Women's World title, also dubbed "The Burke" to honor the all-time great, the following night.

Held on the opening night of NWA's two-day anniversary spectacular, the Burke Invitational is conducted under "gauntlet" rules. A new contestant enters the ring every 90 seconds with eliminations coming via pinfall or submission. To date, two grapplers have claimed victory on NWA's grandest stage.

At NWA 73, Chelsea Green outlasted the competition in her NWA debut to take home the obscenely large trophy — and (unsuccessfully) challenge Kamille for gold the next night. A year later, Max the Impaler bulldozed the field of contestants to claim the cup for The Wasteland...and, like Green, also came up short against Kamille.

As in years past, Kamille pulls double duty at *NWA 75*, taking place Aug. 26-27, in St. Louis. On opening night, "The Crush" Natalia Markova challenges for the strap.

After battling coast-to-coast in a heated rivalry, Markova has yet to wrest the title from "The One Time" champ. Though "The Crush" has proven a game challenge, even picking up victories over "The Brickhouse" in tag action, many — including Kamille — have confirmed this is likely the Russian bombshell's last shot at the champion.

Whomever emerges with the title is guaranteed a tough weekend. The champ (whether Kamille or Markova) faces the winner of the Burke Invitational on Night 2.

With so much riding on the outcome of the Burke Invitational, and a new No. 1 contender guaranteed to emerge, we take a look at this year's crop of known competitors.

The Competitors

Currently nine names have been formally announced for the Burke Invitational Gauntlet. The talent pool combines returning favorites, current NWA stars and top prospects from across the country. Additional names could be added at a later date.
















World TV Title.

Many say "The Masterpiece" is the greatest TV title challenge to date.
What is your take?

He truly is the real bench mark for my reign as NWA TV champion. Saying that, I've beaten him before, so I know it's doable. This situation is different, however; he's got a chip on his shoulder and a point to prove. He's got nothing to lose, and I do. I'm looking at Chris like he's the NWA World's Heavyweight Champion. He's the guy I have to beat to become what I already should be. I don't think Chris realizes what he's done. He has to be able to live with himself after his failure to capture my TV title.

It seems nobody can escape "The Masterlock." How will you avoid it? Simple, I'll never get in it! When we meet at NWA 75, it will be a battle of which of us locks on our submission first. I think the person who walks out as NWA World Television champion will be as simple as who gets his hold on first. Will it be The Masterlock or my Crossface? I think you know my answer.

Kamille keeps saying you're destined to be NWA Worlds champion. Do you feel she's under appreciating your reign as NWA World TV champion?

No, not at all. I think Kamille sees me as more than just the NWA World Television champion — like I do. In both our minds, I should be holding the "Ten Pounds of Gold" right now as the NWA World's Heavyweight Champion. The TV title has a legendary history, which I'm proud to be part of... and Kamille is incredibly happy for and supportive of that. At the same time, she also knows I currently own the wrong belt

If you successfully defend against Adonis at NWA 75, you could cash in your 'Lucky 7' for a shot at the World's Title. Do you have a preference whether Tyrus or EC3 walks out as champ?

Correct, if I beat Chris, I get to 'Lucky 7' for a shot...It's funny though. I didn't realize I could just toss away a championship and somehow get a shot at the World's heavyweight champ. Here I am, defending my title over and over... What an idiot! Why do I even defend it? Next time I'll just toss the TV championship away like trash and get my title shot. Got it!

'Jokes' aside, I am a fighting champion. If that means I go another seven, or 20, or 50 wins, I'll do whatever to solidify my name as a fighting, defending, winning and people's champion. I'll fight until it's undeniable to everyone that I am the future of the NWA, the benchmark and measuring stick of what it is to be a professional wrestler in the NWA and the world.

EC3 or Tyrus? I couldn't give a @#%\$. One will have what I want... and that one will know 100-percent that the target on their back is reason to worry — because I'll be coming for the bullseye!



EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW

FORMER NWA WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPION

Leilani Kai

Leilani Kai remembers it well, that day in 1971. Though she'd seen the greats of her generation on television, she was 14-years-old before she saw women's wrestling *live* for the first time.

"After that, I knew I was going to end up being a wrestler," admits Kai. "I'd skip school to run to the TV to watch it."

Kai didn't take long to go from cutting classes to attend Florida Championship Wrestling TV tapings to being in the ring. Shortly after high school, the Fabulous Moolah pushed the future star from trainee to professional in just two weeks!

"Maybe I got all my basics down really quickly," jokes Kai of her lightning-fast debut, "Or maybe I was just ahead of myself."

Either way, over the next 30 years, Kai didn't *just* "end up being a wrestler." She became one of the most accomplished women in history, amassing three World singles championships and *six* World tag title reigns. In 2006, she was inducted into the NWA Hall of Fame.

Within months of turning pro, Kai was traveling the expansive 1970s territory system, working NWA promotions from Alaska to Florida and coast-to-coast. By 21, she was a two-time NWA Women's tag champ with long-time partner Judy Martin.

Eventually Kai "went north to New York." There she and Wendi Richter swapped the WWF Women's title in 1985.

Much of her career though, Kai notes, was spent overseas. During one of 40-plus tours of Japan, Kai and Martin met career-defining rivals The Jumping Bomb Angels.

Soon Martin and Kai — now 'The Glamour Girls' managed by "The Mouth of the South" Jimmy Hart — began trading the WWF Women's tag titles with the legendary Japanese tandem. Even then, Kai says, she took the NWA with her... Quite literally.

"We used the NWA titles when we worked up there," she admits, "They never gave us WWF titles, so we used the NWA belts — the whole time!"

On March 12, 2003, Kai fulfilled a lifelong goal, capturing

the NWA Women's World title. "It was a dream come true when I became a champion for the NWA," she recalls, "I never thought that would happen."



More recently, Kai's watched current Women's World Champion Kamille far eclipse her own 465 reign. The legend heaps praise on "The Brickhouse."

"She's just wonderful, such a great athlete," Kai gushes.

"I think Kamille's the perfect champion," she continues. "She's going to be a Ric Flair type, someone who just lingers in the title picture forever."

Equally fond of Natalia Markova, who challenges for "The Burke" in the Night 1 main event of the upcoming two-day *NWA 75* pay-per-view, Kai's known "The Crush" since her arrival in the U.S. from Russia, She says Markova could be the one to finally unseat Kamille.

"Natalia is really working so hard," she says, "She's changed so much since she got here. She's always loved the NWA; she and Kamille will be great together."

As a lifelong fan, Tuesday episodes of *NWA Powerrr* occasionally make Kai emotional. It's a reminder, she says, of what she's long loved about pro wrestling.

"It's like it was! It's entertaining, it's fun, and it reminds me of how it used to be — especially the studio setting," she shares. "It reminds me of going to those studio TV tapings when I was 14.

"I've always been old-school — and always will be," Kai concludes. "And I'll always be NWA, no matter what. It's iust me!"
